## Statement of intent

#### **Our School Mission Statement:**

We make learning irresistible by teaching amazing lessons that empower children to make stunning progress.

Our current school objectives 2024-2025 are:

- KEY OBJECTIVE 1: Improve the quality of teaching, learning and assessment in English so that attainment by the end of KS2 in reading, writing and GPS is at least in line with national expectations
- KEY OBJECTIVE 2: Improve the quality of teaching, learning and assessment in maths across the school so that attainment by the end of KS2 is at least in line with national expectations.
- KEY OBJECTIVE 3: To develop the consistency of teaching and learning approaches used in all KS2 classes, enhancing pupil engagement, understanding, and outcomes through the implementation of effective pedagogical strategies.
- KEY OBJECTIVE 4 To improve the quality of lunchtime playtimes for all pupils through the implementation of the OPAL (Outdoor Play and Learning) programme, with the aim of enhancing pupil engagement, social skills, and overall wellbeing.

Our ultimate objectives are:

- to narrow the attainment gap between disadvantaged and nondisadvantaged pupils across the curriculum.
- for all disadvantaged pupils in school to make or exceed nationally expected progress rates.
- to support our children's health and wellbeing to enable them to access learning at an appropriate level.

We aim to achieve these through:

- embedding the Mainstream Core Standards throughout the curriculum to ensure that all teaching and learning opportunities meet the needs of all the pupils so they build on prior knowledge and know more and remember more. This learning is built systematically in all year groups in all subjects.
- ensuring that the needs of socially disadvantaged pupils are quickly identified, assessed and addressed.
- providing quality CPD for all staff to raise the profile and attainment of students eligible for Pupil Premium funding within the school.
- providing an inclusive and supportive environment for all children.
- ensuring the strategic leadership of training and development for all adults across the school supports improved outcomes for all pupils.
- recognising that not all pupils who are socially disadvantaged are registered or qualify for free school meals.
- Providing CPD to enhance teacher understanding and confidence in supporting pupils with ASC
- ensuring proactive communication is made with parents and carers of children who would benefit from further support.

The Pupil Premium plan is designed to ensure that funding allocated to Warden House Primary School is used to tackle disadvantage (particularly at a time of a cost of living crisis, within which our percentage of pupil premium percentage has grown 10% since 2020) and reaches the children who need it.

We are committed to improving outcomes for every child and to invest resources to ensure that every child receives the support and challenge they require to succeed.

The Pupil Premium funding is used to support the learning, development and engagement of eligible children in a variety of ways to close gaps and reach each individual child's potential.

## Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

Challenge number	Detail of challenge
1	High deprivation area with an increased amount of pupils needing SALT support on entry and this having potential to slow progress in other years.
2	Limited cultural capital experiences.
3	Some PP pupils have poor wellbeing, emotional regulation and resilience skills which impacts on learning across the curriculum.
4	Parental engagement for some PP pupils is not as strong as for other pupils.
5	Low academic starting points, particularly with oral language and vocabulary development, leads to reduced levels of skills and understanding with early maths and English.
6	The difference in attendance of pupil premium children compared to non-pupil premium children has increased.

## Part B: Review of the previous academic year

## Outcomes for disadvantaged pupils

Our internal formative and summative assessments during 2023/2024 identified that the performance of disadvantaged pupils varied in reading, writing and maths in the different year groups. Writing and maths attainment has been identified as a whole school area of focus, this is a common theme for all year groups and pupils identified as pupil premium. These areas of development have been identified as key improvement targets on our SIP for 2024-2025.

Our assessment of the reasons for these outcomes indicates that the long-term impact of restrictions and limitations of attendance and consistency of provision, which started due to Covid-19 impact has disrupted all subject areas throughout the school in varying degrees. A bigger impact has been seen with the cohorts in year 4, 5 and 6. As evidenced in schools across the country, school closure was most detrimental to our disadvantaged pupils, and they were not able to benefit from our pupil premium funded improvements to teaching and targeted interventions to the degree we had intended.

The outcomes for writing in 2022-2023 had risen to 52.5% (up from 39% in the prior year) with 38.9% of children identified as pupil premium achieving ARE (up from 15.4% in 2021-2022). This trend has continued into 2023-2024, with 60% pupils achieving ARE in writing, however, only 48% of children identified as pupil premium met the age expected standard.

Our curriculum is continually reviewed to support all pupils, this will continue our drive to improve standards for all pupils and support our achievement of the intended outcomes set out in the pupil premium plan for this period.

Every subject has a clear progression of knowledge and skills, so all children know more and remember more. The Kapow scheme has been brought in to further support several subjects, this will provide further consistency in support for development of knowledge and understanding throughout the curriculum for geography, history and science.

Full-time provision and pastoral support from the FLO has improved well-being of vulnerable pupils and additional tutoring targeted disadvantaged pupils to close gaps.

The gap between non pupil premium children's attendance and those pupils identified as pupil premium has got wider in 2024-2025. This has been impacted further by the improvement in the attendance of the pupils not identified as pupil premium. The strategies and systems in place have been further enhanced into 2024-2025 to accelerate improve attendance for children identified as pupil premium, with analysis of Term 1 data in 2024-2025 showing a 1.62% increase for these pupils compared to the same period last year.

Regular reviews of our provision for disadvantaged pupils have led to improving outcomes for the vast majority over the period of the strategy last year. Many strategies are now embedded in the school systems and for those that have not made expected progress we will be continuing to evaluate and adapt our provision to best suit their need moving forwards, these discussions take place within the pupil progress meetings with each class.
